

Enrico Fermi

1901-1954 A.D. Italian-born American physicist and Nobel Prize winner (1938) for his work on nuclear reactions. He joined the Manhattan Project to work on the construction of the first atom bomb.



Eric Liddell

1902-1945 A.D. Born the son of missionaries in Tientsin in North China, and a missionary there later in his life. Gold and Bronze medalist in the 1924 Olympics, Eric learned that his heats were scheduled for a Sunday. He created a stir by keeping the Sabbath, opting to run longer heats on other days. His witness has been an encouragement to many since.



Gladys Aylward

1902-1970 A.D. English-born missionary to China who began as a "foot inspector," using her position to evangelize villagers. Known as "Ai-weh-deh" (Virtuos One) after stopping a prison riot, she went on to shepherd 100 orphans across a mountain to safety during a Japanese invasion. She continued her work with orphans, prisoners, refugees, and Buddhists in China until she died.



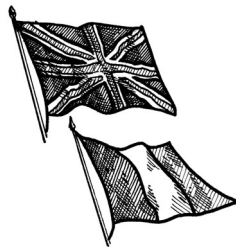
Ayatollah Ruholla Khomeini

1902-1989 A.D. Iranian Shiite Muslim leader who, although arrested and exiled in 1963-64, returned in 1979 as leader of the Islamic Revolution. His reign was marked by his hostility towards Western culture and his strict Islamic convictions.



Watchman Nee (Ni To-sheng)

1903-1972 A.D. Chinese missionary and author born in the Swatow, Fukien province, his life revolved around his study of the Bible and other missionaries. He was influential throughout China in the planting of house churches. Imprisoned by Communists in 1952, he was never released and died in prison.



Entente Cordiale

1904 A.D. A mutual agreement between France and Britain which encouraged greater diplomatic assistance in opposition to Germany. It also formed a basis for allied strategy in the future triple entente.



Welsh Revival of 1904 A.D.

Led by the fervent prayers of a young coal miner, Evan Roberts, spiritual revival swept across the people of Wales. Due to a mighty manifestation of the Spirit, many lives, businesses, schools, homes, and churches were drastically changed.



Russo-Japanese War

1904-1905 A.D. Due to Russia's expansion into Manchuria, the Japanese attacked Port Arthur. With the destruction a few months later of their Baltic fleet, Russia surrendered, resulting in Japan's dominance in Manchuria and Korea.



Salvador Dalí

1904-1989 A.D. Spanish surrealist painter whose works include *Persistence of Memory* and *Christ of St. John the Cross*.



Triple Entente

1907 A.D. An unofficial alliance between Russia, France, and Britain which formed to oppose the Triple Alliance.



Baroness Maria von Trapp

1905-1987 A.D. Austrian nun and singer sent in 1926 to tutor one of the seven children of Baron Georg von Trapp and staying on as governess. Marrying a year later, they had three more children. During the Nazi occupation of Austria in WWII they fled over the Alps on foot, leaving their estate and friends behind, eventually arriving in America destitute, where they toured as "The Trapp Family Singers."



Dietrich Bonhoeffer

1906-1945 A.D. German theologian, author, and pastor whose involvement with anti-Hitler conspirators led to his eventual arrest and confinement at Buchenwald concentration camp, where he was eventually hanged. His writings from the camp were compiled and published in 1953 as *Letters and Papers from Prison*.
